Miracle foal born in Redwings' care after road collision



A foal whose mum was found badly injured and stuck in some railings at Tilbury Docks, Essex, after being involved in a crash, has arrived safe and well and is flourishing in Redwings'

Miracle foal Monarch was born to Majesty at one of Redwings' Norfolk sites on 7th April. Mother and son were named in honour of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee year.

Majesty was originally taken to a private boarding establishment and treated for a broken nose and chest injuries after the accident in November. On realising that she was also in foal, Redwings was asked to take her.

Nicola Berryman, Redwings Welfare Veterinary Surgeon, said: "No one knew what the outcome would be for Majesty's unborn foal, and we were all thrilled when he arrived safely and in

"We don't know who the father is but it's clear he was a big horse as Monarch is huge! It won't be much longer before he is towering over his

With a little help from our vet team to get Monarch to feed, the pair were soon doing well.

At the beginning of June, they were moved to a closed site, north of Norwich, and he and Majesty were turned out on grass - just in time for the Queen's Jubilee celebrations.

Mariah and Carey welcome new friends

Do vou remember Mariah and Carey's story from the last edition of the newsletter?

Mariah, above left, and Carey came into us in tragic circumstances in January after an incident on the A11 in Suffolk the night before. Very sadly, Carey's mum was killed after getting onto the road.

The youngsters - aged around two and six months when they arrived - were underweight and had lice and scabby skin which they were treated for. They were named after the lead police officer at the scene, who is called Mariah, and who we're grateful to.

The pair have made great friends with more recent arrivals Monarch (and mum Majesty) and Pickle (see story opposite) - who are all turned out in adjoining fields!

Pony in a 'Pickle' rescued by Redwings



A pony came into Redwings' care in April after an eye injury and serious infection meant she needed urgent treatment.

'Pickle', as she has been named, was in a great amount of pain and couldn't see out of the affected eye. The piebald cob filly was just four or five months old and had a high worm burden.

She had surgery to remove the eye at our Reception Centre within 24 hours of arriving, and whilst still under quarantine conditions.

Julie Harding, Senior Field Officer and Reception Centre Manager, said:

'Unfortunately, circumstances meant her owner wasn't able to provide the veterinary attention she needed, and they agreed to sign her over to us so that her welfare could be secured.

"We think she probably scratched her eye on some fencing, causing the initial injury, followed by a serious infection.

"Sadly, her recovery was complicated by the high worm burden, but she was in the best place, receiving the best care to deal with it and some very special company - Phoenix the foal's teddy

A tribute to Phoenix was in our last edition of the newsletter, after we lost him just before Christmas despite all efforts possible to help him recover from extensive burns.

Julie said: "For our dedicated nursing team, seeing her with Phoenix's favourite toy was heart-breaking and heartwarming all at the same time. We're so happy to say that she came through the operation and has adapted brilliantly."



Happy new life for Commons ponies

A herd of 40 former Commons ponies are living their best life and helping to increase biodiversity at conservation sites across Wales - including the habitats of rare butterflies and birds thanks to Redwings' support.

The ponies were removed from Cefn Bryn Common in South Wales to help people with grazing rights, who had become overwhelmed by numbers after issues with ponies being abandoned at the location.

> They passed into the care of The Gower Pony Experience, a not-for-profit promoting best practices in grazing with ponies in the area, and they have been supported by Redwings to microchip, passport and castrate where necessary.

Jenni Nellist from The Gower Pony Experience said: "We could not have done this



without the help of Redwings. Together we've helped the people with grazing rights on the Common and given these ponies what, for them, is the perfect new home. In turn, they're helping the environment and other species to flourish."

Nic de Brauwere, Redwings Head of Welfare and Behaviour, said: "Projects like this are such an important part of us finding suitable 'roles' for the equines who need our help."



Our Education and Campaigns team have been busy leading the way on initiatives to help horses and their owners across the UK – all thanks to your support.



s part of this year's Strangles Awareness Week (SAW)
Redwings and the 10 other SAW collaborators invited horse owners to take part in a unique Temp Check
Challenge! A raised temperature (fever) is almost always the first sign of an infectious disease like strangles, generally developing before the horse becomes contagious to others. By monitoring their horses' temperatures routinely, especially after mixing with other horses at an event or moving to a new yard, owners are better able to spot fever early and take action to stop possible infection spreading.

Owners commonly check a horse's temperature when they notice signs their horse may be unwell, but, in the case of infectious disease, by this point it's often too late to have stopped the disease in its tracks.

The Temp Check Challenge asked owners to take their horses' temperatures each day during SAW and upload the reading onto our special online Temp Checker, which automatically calculates each horse's average. Horses' temperatures can vary so knowing what is normal for an individual helps flag when something is not normal, and there may be an underlying health issue. This could be an infectious disease, other infection, colic or another illness.

The Temp Check Challenge didn't only catch the imagination of horse owners and yard managers, but almost 70 vet practices and even top GB rider Piggy March! Watch Piggy talking to Redwings Equine Behaviour Manager Sarah Hallsworth in our special video to introduce temperature checking to people who may not have done it before. You'll also meet Piggy's stunning horse Cooley Lancer (aka Swiss Roll)!

Mildred had well and truly found her place in all our hearts after the dedication she showed Phoenix as his foster-mum, and now we are delighted to tell you she is happily settled in her new home.

Mildred was rehomed in April to her new family in Norfolk with Guardian

Gabby and her cob gelding Hugo. Having recently lost her 32-year-old gelding Hamish, Gabby did not want Hugo to be lonely. Mildred – who has always shown a truly caring nature – was the perfect fit.

Mildred's Guardian Gabby said: "I contacted Redwings because I knew they would help pick a horse that they thought would fit into mine and Hugo's life, and our experience with Mildred has felt like that - it was like she was handpicked just for us! When I came to meet Mildred at Redwings with my mum, she won us over with her love of a head rub.

"Mildred has such a lovely personality, with just the right amount of sass to tell Hugo when he's being a bit much! We have seen the pair of them playing together, and that just makes me so happy."

Sharky and Amy – a true partnership

s it a bird? Is it a plane? No it's Redwings Sharky and his Guardian Amy!

Sharky was rescued by SWHP in 2009. He was one of six horses removed with the help of the Police from grounds of a hotel in South Wales. The horses all had worm burdens and were in need of farriery care.



Amy took Sharky on loan from SWHP (Society for the Welfare of Horses and Ponies, which merged with Redwings in 2019) in 2011. Recalling his days as a youngster, Amy said: "He was a cheeky and boisterous boy. 11 years later and he is just the best horse, and I look back at everything we have achieved together and it's epic - I swear I know him better than he knows himself these days!

"We showjump, event, team chase and take part in all sorts of events. Over the years we have achieved tonnes together, including winning the 'Blue Light Championship' showjumping for riders who are part of the emergency services and competing in a relay event at the Royal Welsh Show. To say I'm proud of him is an understatement."

At only 15.2hh, Sharky, a Cob gelding, is sometimes the smallest horse in the line-up for his events but he more than makes up for his lack of size with his spirit, and his partnership with Amy.

"I look back at our beginning, and the training and resilience our partnership has taken has been totally worth it. Sharks is just amazing, we are a great team and telling anyone about our achievements is a proud moment for me. It brings me to tears."



Back in (Show) Business!

his summer we were delighted to return to the Royal Norfolk Show, as it was held in full for the first time since the start of Covid-19. It was a pleasure to be back meeting supporters, old and new, face-to-face and we were joined by two very special ponies who helped us spread the word about the Redwings Rehoming Scheme.

Redwings Rocket and Redwings Stardust were stars of the Show's 'Rescue Village' and received lots of fuss from the public, and lots of interest about offering them a loving home too!

Then they joined some already rehomed Redwings ponies in the Rescue Classes at the prestigious event, and we're delighted to say 'Team Redwings' even brought home some rosettes!

Redwings Patchwork, attending the Show with her Guardians Yvette and Victoria, triumphed in the Ridden Rescue class, and Redwings Edward came 2nd in the In-hand Rescue class. Joining Edward in the In-hand class were Redwings Matty who took 5th place and the 'Rescue Village' stars Redwings Stardust, 6th place, and Redwings Rocket, 7th place.

Patchwork, a 13.2hh, 13-year-old cob mare, came to us here at Redwings in 2009, as one of 11 horses from a site in Rickmansworth. The horses had been abandoned and were straying onto the grounds of a local school. They were in poor condition, with suspected heavy worm burdens. Patchwork's blood tests also showed she had problems with both her intestines and liver.

Yvette said: "Patchwork, or Millie as she is known to us, has done us proud today. We don't show regularly, and she spends most of the time as a happy hacker with my mum, but we love to bring her to the Norfolk Show to represent Redwings and show how great rehomed Redwings horses can be!"

Rescue classes are judged on a combination of their rescue story and transformation, and their show on the day – so they are a fantastic opportunity for people to see rescued ponies thriving in their new homes.

Here at Redwings we are always striving for the best for the horses in our care, and that would not be possible without our incredibly talented teams or - as we like to call them - our 'Sanctuary Stars', from our team of trainers at our Behaviour centre to our vets and experts who share their expertise to help horses across the UK. Let's find out what they've been up to...

n previous editions of the newsletter we have introduced you to the team who work in our Horse Hospital, and now we are turning the spotlight on our specialist Behaviour Centre and the team of trainers and carers who work there.

Our Behaviour Centre is a unique resource - a dedicated Sanctuary farm for our residents who need extra support in their behavioural training. Often, horses that live there may have been semi-feral when rescued, meaning they had little-to-no human contact before, or have fearful associations with humans due to past mistreatment or neglect. It is the job of our team at the Behaviour Centre to support them and, through training, help them to enjoy a life at Redwings with as little stress and worry

With their knowledge of how horses learn, the team are able to be flexible with their training approach. Where possible they will use positive reinforcement, with their 'go to' tool being clicker training where, simply put, you mark a behaviour you want with a click and then deliver a food reward. Training this way gives the team the opportunity to train 'at liberty' - without any restraint e.g. headcollar and leadrope. If the horse is feeling unhappy, he can choose to leave the training session, without being forced to stay by pressure. Being able to control the situation helps build trust between the horse and trainer, and so can be particularly useful for horses that are very fearful of people.

The team are currently researching the use of 'start button' behaviours. For example, using a cone or some rubber matting that the horse can stand on or touch to indicate that a handling

procedure (such as handling their legs or an injection) can begin. At any point the horse can walk away, and training will not restart until the horse returns voluntarily to the start button. Not only does this give the horse choice, but it can also be much safer for the handler or vet.

Nancy came to the Behaviour Centre from Redwings SWHP on the Welsh border as the team there knew she would benefit from some extra handling support. She was rescued in 2012 when she was found on Gelligaer Common struggling to eat because of very long teeth.

Due to Nancy being very fearful, her trainer Emma has been introducing Nancy to a start button. She will touch a cone with her nose to let Emma know she is ready to proceed with her leg handling and will move away from the cone if she is finding the training too challenging. Her training is coming on much guicker since Emma has introduced this and she is very proud of her!



Sanctuary regulations in Wales

emember our feature 'When is a sanctuary not a sanctuary?' in last year's autumn newsletter? Redwings has long had concerns about the regular discovery of rescue centres that aren't able to meet the basic needs of animals in their care, sometimes leading to horses living in terrible conditions and having to be rescued from their 'rescuers'.



We are pleased to be able to share our own thoughts and experiences as part of a group working with the Welsh Government to introduce regulations for animal sanctuaries operating in Wales. Legislation is already in place in Scotland and Westminster has expressed its intention to bring in English regulations in the future.

Redwings has been involved in many cases of failing rescue centres, often bringing many equines into our own care to provide the food, health care and behavioural rehabilitation so many of them have been lacking. We believe that by assisting with the introduction of effective regulations in Wales, we can better prevent serious welfare issues arising in a sanctuary setting, while the many knowledgeable, caring centres out there can continue their fantastic work and be better recognised and supported.



long-awaited public consultation on Equine ID regulations took place earlier this year, with Redwings being one of many equine charities submitting responses to the 48 questions. There are widely acknowledged issues with the current system, resulting in many equines not being accurately recorded on the Central Equine Database. In the first six months of this year, of the 39 horses and donkeys that came into Redwings care, 19 did not have a microchip (a legal requirement) and only seven of the 20 who did have a microchip were correctly registered as belonging to their most recent owner. Being able to link a horse to their owner is essential if we are to be able to hold owners to account when a horse is found they are sold.



to have been neglected, abused or abandoned. Currently, many owners simply walk away with no action able to be taken against them because of lack of evidence that an equine is theirs. Up to date identification records are also vital to help reunite stolen or stray horses with their distressed owners and provide accurate information about an equine's age and vaccination status if



Working in partnership

eight and worms are two of the biggest welfare issues facing the UK's horses. The number of horses carrying an unhealthy amount of fat is known to be almost 50%. rising to over 70% for native ponies. And while worms generally only cause serious horse health problems in large numbers, there is grave concern over growing resistance within worm populations to the anthelmintic drugs (wormers) that we use to control them.

Redwings is taking part in two collaborative groups looking at practical ways to tackle these important topics. We know that charities, researchers and other organisations coming together to speak with one voice helps us to reach far more people than working alone.

The Obesity Roundtable is looking at ways to help owners recognise when their horse would benefit from losing a few pounds, and to help them achieve this in a healthy sustainable way.

The Anthelmintic Resistance Working Group aims to reduce use of wormers by encouraging all horse owners to use regular worm egg counts to check the worm population in their equine and only use a wormer if it is really necessary.

Many new arrivals at Redwings are affected by health issues associated with being overweight or having a large worm burden. Our teams are incredibly experienced in treating these issues and ensuring individuals are managed to help protect them from becoming overweight or developing an unhealthy worm population in future.



This paves the way for a new donkey facility, stabling for Sanctuary residents, and a quarantine area. But with challenges in the supply chain and rising costs of materials, these developments will take time.



Year-round care

Care team members at our Sanctuary farms ensure that every resident can lead their life in a healthy and safe home, where all their needs are met. Some horses, ponies and donkeys at Redwings need treatment that changes over the course of the year. Tilbury was a just a youngster when he was rescued seven years ago, his life is very different today thanks to a real team effort that adapts with the seasons.

ilbury's skin is very sensitive to sunlight. From spring to mid-autumn he is treated daily, without which sunshine causes a painful reaction across his body and face. When the UV index is 'moderate' or stronger on any day, the team prepares him by putting on a special UV fly mask and rug. They apply sunblock around his eyes and nostrils twice a day. On the days when the sunshine is strongest, Tilbury is brought into a stable to shelter from the worst effects of the sun. The severity of his photosensitivity is just one of the reasons Tilbury was brought

into Redwings' care.



Tilbury is named after the south Essex town close to where he was found. Redwings Field Officer Jo was responding to a welfare report at a site well known for the number of grazing horses and ponies, when she saw the young grey colt for the first time. He was tethered, underweight and suffering from a nasty skin condition.



During the following night someone untethered Tilbury, but nobody came forward to accept responsibility for him. Under advice from a vet, he was seized and taken to a local equine vet practice where he was given immediate treatment, including tests to determine the cause of his skin condition. Tilbury arrived at Redwings Ada Cole after five days of vet treatment for his skin condition, lice infestation, checks and tests.

It was a sunny day and from quite a distance I could see his skin was raw and just how serious his condition was. As I walked up to Tilbury he didn't react to me but I could see more and more clearly how uncomfortable he was. Straight away I made plans to return the next morning with an RSPCA Inspector. We'd make sure he got the care he needed, by removing him from that field if needs be.

Different season, new challenges

Tilbury was worryingly thin when he was rescued. With time and some TLC, he gained weight and condition which helped him to feel comfortable in his new home and to move with more freedom as part of a new herd.

Today, he still finds it difficult to retain condition during the winter months, so to

make sure he does not lose too much weight, he is given hard feed as well as forage. Tilbury's diet is also supplemented with a balancer all year round which gives him the vitamins and minerals

he needs to maintain things like good eyesight and a healthy immune system. Part of Tilbury's year-round care is the treatment he receives for arthritis in his hind legs.

He is given daily medication and if he needs more help with his movement, the Redwings vet team apply additional treatment to relieve the affected joint.



Year-round care for all

All the steps taken to care for Tilbury have helped to bring out his curious, occasionally mischievous nature. Tilbury is one of the horses in our sanctuary whose special care needs change considerably with the seasons. As well as year-round treatment for long-term conditions our Sanctuary teams make sure our residents are cared for at the height of summer and during the harshest winter days.

He's definitely a character. I make a point of seeing him each day and he'll always walk over to say 'hello'. I am very lucky because I get to see the full story with a pony like Tilbury, from the condition he was in when rescued to the life he goes on to have, whether that's in sanctuary care or in a guardian home. To see so much change over all that time is a privilege.
