personal thank you! We also wrote and posted special Christmas cards to thank as many people as we could.


We enjoyed this special opportunity so much that we will look forward to hosting another 'Thank you' event – maybe you could be receiving a phone call next!

#### **Charity of the Year!**

Redwings celebrated being named Charity of the Year at the second annual Equestrian Business Awards in October! We were nominated by the public and then a thorough process including interviews, references and mystery shoppers was conducted.

Redwings' CEO Lynn said: "We are absolutely thrilled to be the first winners of this category, which was introduced to the Equestrian Business Awards this year.

"Thank you so much to those who nominated us, to the organisers and a special mention to the runners-up, Munchkins Miniature Shetland Rescue.



The awards had almost 17,000 nominations across 19 categories – which included Event Venue of the Year, Farrier of the Year, Saddle Fitter of the Year and Horse Transporter of the Year.



#### The big 5,000!

We're delighted that our Sounds of the Sanctuary podcast has now received over 5,000 downloads. The second series was released in September and is a true 'behind the scenes' look into life at Redwings, including catch-ups with rescued residents and hearing more from their carers.

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Plus, we produced a special, and very popular, Field Notes episode about fireworks. A powerful interview with Redwings vet Dawn recounted the night of 5th November 2016, where sadly two Redwings residents were put to sleep as a result of trauma due to a nearby firework display. Her interview, plus conversations about changes to fireworks regulations in Scotland, and the RSPCA's 'Bang Out of Order' campaign, draws attention to the dangers posed to horses, and how owners can use their experiences to call for change to their use and regulation. ## 10 years since our biggest ever rescue

In 2023, we remember our single largest rescue and the impact it still has on us today - a decade after it happened.

Some now very familiar faces were amongst 400 ponies discovered in a remote location in south-east Wales over five days in 2013, including Redwings supporter favourite Mildred. Though Mildred is now in a Redwings Guardian home, her foal Phyllis and many of the other horses who came to

us, and the foals born to them, are still resident with us here at Redwings today.

The request for help came from Vale of Glamorgan Trading Standards after discovering the equines trying to survive in the most horrendous of conditions.

A team of Redwings vets and handlers, working alongside local authorities, RSPCA and local council staff, assessed hundreds of animals, many of whom

were undernourished, sick or suffering from a lack of veterinary care, and transported them to safety, treatment and rehabilitation.

We worked with the local authority and welfare charities to find homes for as many as possible. The Blue Cross and British Horse Society both took large groups into their care. Despite the combined efforts of rescuing charities, finding homes for so many ponies proved almost impossible.

Redwings took in over 150 ponies many of them pregnant mares.

Redwings' CEO Lynn said: "Redwings played a key role in leading the rescue of so many animals and supporting the local authorities in prosecuting the owners responsible. The lives of many of the horses rescued have been changed so much for the better thanks to the commitment and skill of our team. We have welcomed new life and some of those rescued have even gone on to start a new chapter in wonderful Guardian homes."

In October 2022 we welcomed three new donkeys to Redwings Oxhill.

Bruno, Martha and Choco came to Redwings as part of an 'exceptional circumstances' intake. Their owner approached Redwings for help as they

could no longer keep the donkeys and wanted to make sure they had a secure future.

Their owner had originally rehomed them from Sussex Horse Rescue Trust a smaller charity which sadly had to close in 2019. At the time Redwings supported the charity by helping to rehome their equines and offering a home to 30 horses who needed to stay in sanctuary

Bruno is 23 years old, Martha, 20 years old, and Choco, who is also Martha's

daughter, is 13. Donkeys are sensitive souls, who form especially strong bonds with their companions, so we knew how important it was for their welfare to keep this trio of friends together.

They have settled well at Redwings Oxhill, and the team are delighted to have them!

They join our Adoption Stars Timothy and Cain and Arya and we're sure there will be lots of donkey antics to come!



### Horsey hero saved friend's life – with a little help from Redwings' vets



One of our residents came to the rescue himself, when he was called up to help save the life of one of his Sanctuary friends. As a healthy, large horse on no medication, Rourke - a 17hh, Irish Draught cross gelding - was the perfect plasma donor when Coral, another Redwings resident, fell ill.

Coral, who came in as part of a welfare case, was flagged as losing weight and, after staff noticed some redworm larvae in her faeces, she went downhill quickly and needed urgent care.

Redwings Veterinary Surgeon Dawn oversaw Coral's care. She said: "Coral was losing protein from her intestines. It was a critical situation, and we could have

"She wouldn't have survived without the intensive care she was given, and the plasma from Rourke was vital in getting her to turn the corner.

"Coral is now doing great and hopefully can be rehomed at some point in the future.

"Rourke did really well during the procedure and had lots of TLC and yummy dinners afterwards. He's a real hero."



## Meet our new arrival



Redwings is caring for a foal found upside down in some

rubble at a location in Essex.

Barney, as he's been named, was discovered abandoned in December. We transported him to House & Jackson Equine Veterinary Hospital for emergency treatment before bringing him to our Reception Centre.

This poor little boy was emaciated underneath his thick coat and had sores all over his body but look at him now!

Despite an RSPCA investigation, no owner could be identified.





The work of our Welfare team and our Field Officers extends far beyond taking horses into our care. In 2022, they identified and intervened with 175 cases, improving the conditions of **622 equines**. This might have been through removal of the equine into our care, but is much more commonly by working with their owners and offering advice - making an immediate positive impact on individual horses' and donkeys' lives.



s rising costs continue to affect people across all parts of society, we have been keenly aware of the potential impact on horse owners' ability to provide for their equines. To help us find out more, Redwings and a small group of

## The rising cost of horse care

charities who are part of the National Equine Welfare Council launched a special survey for horse owners at the end of last year, which ran until 31st January.

Caring for horses is never cheap, and the Cost of Living Survey for Horse Owners wanted to find out where people were experiencing the biggest cost increases in relation to horse care, the impact it was having on them and how they were finding ways to cope if needed.

More than 8,000 people completed the survey and we are currently in the process of analysing the results. The survey findings will be summarised in a public report and shared where appropriate with local and national government bodies.

## **Fireworks**

t may seem unseasonal to be writing about fireworks in the spring, but as many of us are aware, these pyrotechnic products are now being used more commonly to mark other events throughout the year. We anticipate many displays being held in honour of the coronation of our new King in May and will be sharing information in the coming weeks to help people make the most of the celebrations while reducing possible negative consequences of fireworks on horses, other animals and humans.

Having lost three much-loved residents including Sprite and Percy (pictured) to fireworks-related incidents in the past, no one knows better than Redwings the often tragic cost of fireworks to horses and their owners.

This is one of the reasons we have joined a group of both animal and human charities to ask the government to review current regulations around fireworks and consider introducing tighter restrictions to reduce the risks they present. The group members bring together evidence on the impact fireworks can have on dogs and cats as well as horses, alongside insights from military veterans, PTSD sufferers and burns victims. Working together builds a compelling picture of the wide range of people and animals who are caused very real distress and trauma by fireworks.



Last year, Redwings contributed to a public consultation on fireworks held by the Scottish government, and we warmly welcomed subsequent new legislation to better control the sale and use of fireworks in Scotland. With more than 80 residents being cared for by our fabulous team at Redwings Mountains, we are especially pleased these rescued equines will be benefitting from the new regulations as they come into force over the next couple of years.

We would very much like to see Westminster follow the Scottish

government in its efforts to reduce the negative impact of fireworks, and we know we're not alone in this ambition! Many MPs are already supporting calls for a review of current regulations and some retailers are opting to sell low-noise fireworks or not sell fireworks at all in response to consumer feedback.



#### If you would like to support this issue further:

- Sign up online to receive Redwings campaign emails
- Write to your MP to ask him or her to support calls for a review of regulations
- Use customer feedback requests to support more retailers rethinking how they display and sell fireworks
- Consider supporting organised local firework events (especially those using low-noise products) rather than organising or attending back garden displays
- Encourage all horse owners to report any fireworksrelated incident affecting their equine to the British Horse Society via their website or the free Horse I app.

## Redwings Maddie is in great shape





e were delighted to hear that Redwings Maddie, rehomed from Redwings Mountains, and her Guardian Irene have been the recipients of a very important accolade – the British Horse Society 'In Great Shape' Champion sash.

Much like Redwings, the British Horse Society works across the country educating horse owners on the importance of keeping their horses a healthy weight. When they visited Maddie's yard, Maddie scored a perfect 3 for her Body Condition Score and was awarded a rosette for her great shape.

Then, she was voted as Star of the Month and received her sash!

Irene was very proud (quite rightly!) and got in touch to let us know, and we asked her to share some of her tips for keeping Maddie in such great condition. She said: "Her food is weighed out, and in the summer I restrict her grazing if I need to. She gets ridden regularly to help keep her fit through exercise. We're very lucky to have great professionals who visit us - our farrier, vet, dentist, physio and instructor - and they give me their professional opinion and advice to keep her well. I also take every opportunity to get her weighed on a weighbridge to make sure I know exactly how much she weighs." Well done Maddie and Irene!

## Redwings Fig goes to Your Horse Live!



ound as a young filly
shut in a trailer in her
own filth and unable
to stand without help,
Fig had an awful start
in life, but in November
she did Redwings proud,
representing us at the
Your Horse Live event in
Warwickshire.

We rescued Fig in April 2019. She was seized by police, along with several dogs and some poultry, from a site in Suffolk. Fig was extremely emaciated. She had a Body Condition Score of just 0.5 out of 5 (a healthy BCS would be 3). Her feet were also very overgrown and misshapen. She had wounds across her body, which appeared to be pressure sores from the amount of time she had spent lying

down

down.

Thankfully Fig made a full recovery, and her owner was successfully prosecuted by the RSPCA for the suffering caused to Fig and the other animals.

Now all grown up, Fig was one of three ponies chosen to come to Your Horse Live with us to help promote our rehoming scheme. Joined by Matilda and Libby, these three lovely little ponies took the event in their stride! They spent three days meeting the public and representing Redwings in the Rescue Parade. They even got to check out the sights and sounds of the main arena – a fantastic opportunity for some desensitisation training!

All three of them will look forward to spending 2023 in their new Guardian





## Our very own Anna!

hroughout the newsletter, we are sharing stories about our connection to Anna Sewell House (turn to page 10 and 11 to find out more) so it only seemed right to introduce you to Redwings Anna. She was rescued in 2017 from a site in Norfolk. She was one of a number of horses who, inspired by the 140th anniversary of the publication of Black Beauty, were named after characters in the novel, or in Anna's case, the author herself.

The group came to Redwings after concerns were raised for a lame horse, who seemed unable to walk. A Redwings Field Officer and vet attended and found a mare suffering from severe laminitis. On inspection, many of the group were found overweight and with overgrown hooves. They were also unhandled, making any possible treatment difficult, so



they were signed over to Redwings so our specialist Behaviour Team could help with their rehabilitation.

Anna was a youngster when she was rescued, but in 2021 she was rehomed, aged four, as an unbacked project. Her Guardian Nina said: "She is a sensitive soul, but very intelligent and she really wants to please. She is now starting to come on in her schooling work and she loves hacking and having a plod in the countryside.

"She is the sweetest, most lovable horse. She loves attention and a good bum scratch. I feel so lucky to have her in my life and I can't wait for what the future holds for her."

## A record for 2022!

ast year saw 154 rescued horses and ponies find a new home on our Guardianship rehoming scheme - another record —number for Redwings!

These numbers only tell half the story of the work that teams from across the Sanctuary carry out to select suitable horses and prepare them for life in a home outside Redwings.

Teams from across our sites will highlight horses that they think would be suitable to rehome. Then our rehoming teams, at sites across Norfolk, Essex and Warwickshire, begin a very thorough training programme to prepare them for their new home. Meanwhile, our team of veterinary surgeons and nurses will make sure our rehoming candidates have health checks, plus routine dentals and vaccinations to get them ready for life out in the big wide world!

Our Field Officers carry out home checks to ensure that the new homes are suitable for the ponies, as well as visiting ponies already rehomed to ensure they are getting on ok. Back at HQ, there's admin to do! The team prepare all the documents needed – including the ponies' passports and signed loan agreements.

When all this is done, we wave a cheery goodbye to our ponies as they set off for a new life, but we're always at the end of the phone if their new Guardian needs any support.

This is all vital work so we can make room at the Sanctuary for more horses in desperate need of our help, and none of it would be possible without your support. Thank you!

On 24th November, the anniversary of the publication of Black Beauty, we were delighted to hold an official opening ceremony for Redwings at Anna Sewell House, the birthplace of the author of this ground-breaking novel, in Great Yarmouth, Norfolk.

The characterisation of this handsome, gentle horse is absolutely unforgettable, and I'm sure it was Anna Sewell's amazing storytelling that taught me to view animals as living, breathing, feeling creatures who deserve our empathy and compassion.

For me it's all about Anna. Such a clever, brave and outspoken lady. Today we are familiar with terms such as 'positive reinforcement', 'desensitisation' and equine learning theory. Anna was promoting these same ideologies back in the 1870s. She was so far ahead of her time - for this she is my true hero.


## Mountains' Maintenance Team are marvellous makers!




## From pounds to Nickels!

overeign arrived at Redwings in May 2019 from a site near London. The group of horses were largely unhandled. Sovereign had a high worm burden which was causing poor condition and other medical issues. She had a foal at foot, who we called Nickel, but she was also pregnant. As you may have guessed, we named them after types of currency, and they became our 'Money Group'.

Sovereign safely gave birth to her second foal, Ruble, within our care. Today Sovereign is cared for at one of our sites in Norfolk, and foal Ruble has been under the expertise of our Behaviour Centre Team and their handling programme for foals - otherwise known as 'foal school'!

Nickel also arrived with worrying health implications. He was in poor condition and had redworm and anaemia. Our vet team feared for Nickel's health when he first arrived with us, but with their hard work, medication and a correct worming programme, Nickel made a full recovery. A happy and healthy Nickel was able to be rehomed in September 2022.

## Discovered by Darcy





Pamela made the five and-a-half hour journey from her home in South Wales for the opening event, and her and her collection even appeared on ITV Anglia.


She added: "At the opening event I thought 'Yes, this is exactly what was supposed to happen. They've come home."

# Bringing hop Changing live

Phyllis lives at Redwings and now spends her day sharing a field with her friends Howard (pictured), Rosco, Evelyn and Wallace. She came into our care as a foal, along with her mother, Mildred.

he was born in a boarding yard, a special facility that we sometimes use to give rescued horses a secure home before we have the capacity to bring them to our Reception Centre. In this unique case it would take over a year before these mares and foals could begin their lives as part of our sanctuary herd.

Mildred was among almost 400 ponies rescued from one site. It is the single largest rescue we have ever been a part of; the number of animals suffering in appalling conditions called for an enormous effort from our team.







Many of the ponies at the premises were undernourished, sick or suffering from a lack of veterinary care.

All were affected by the awful conditions. Ponies were found standing in deep mud, there was a lack of clean fresh water, and most had no food at all.



Some showed clear signs of untreated injury and the site was strewn with hazards such as sharp metal and barbed wire. While they lived in desperate, filthy conditions they could see grass growing in neighbouring fields.

It took five days to remove all the ponies from the site. A team of Redwings vets and handlers, working alongside local authorities, RSPCA and local council staff, assessed hundreds of animals and made sure they were safely transported to the private boarding yard.

We offered a home to over 150 ponies, many of them pregnant mares with foals. Over time we admitted all the ponies through our Reception Centre.



Nancy was rescued as part of this case. She was in poor condition and suffering from a painful infestation of leg mites. Today Nancy is in much better physical health, but she is affected by ataxia, a neurological condition that causes her to tremor and affects her co-ordination.

Like many of the rescued mares in this group, she was in foal and later that year gave birth to Ingrid who lives at one of our closed sanctuary sites.

The change brought about in the lives of the ponies rescued as part of this case is almost beyond recognition. Last Christmas was the first in a new home for Mildred, with the companionship of a new friend in the care of one of our wonderful Redwings Guardians. Nancy and Phyllis will continue to lead their lives secure at the Sanctuary.

Through experience we have learned how to lead rescues involving hundreds of horses and give them the care they desperately need. With your support we can continue to back campaigns to be there for horses that need us, strive for improvements in the laws that protect horses and greater power for those enforcing them, be there at the forefront of emergency rescues to take horses to safety, and provide the commitment and care to give rescued animals a safe and happy future.

A case of such scale can seem overwhelming but through leading collaborative efforts we will do everything possible to give the horses affected the life they deserve.
